Dolbear, in the United States, in 1883, and by Sir Willam Preece, engineer-in-chief c: the British tele graph system, in Great Britain, in 1893 en' 1394, it is obvious that the great discovery of Heinrich Hertz, who, in 1558, not only proved that electric waves follow exactly the same laws ii light waves but who showed how D producce these electric waves by purely physical means as well as how to detect them, forms the basis of the Marconi system of wireless teleg-

But however much Marconi may be indebted to Hertz for his principles and to later physicists such as Branley and Poposs for certain mechanical appliances, it is indubitable that to the Italian inventor, whose mother, it is interesting to note, is an Irishwoman, evolved a system of wireless telegrapil; capable of transmitting and indicating electric waves over long dictances; and time, which seldom' fails to do justice and to give each! man his due in these matters, will , ^{rightly} associate his name with the real paternity of this stupendous in-

President Diaz has commuted to imprisonment for 20 years the death sentence which brought Nicolas Luna within the shadow of the death wall in Belem prison. This action was taken because of

hibits the execution of a condemned man when five years has elapsed 10-Business, Stock Quotations. since the date of sentence. 12—Brief City News. technically this was not the case with Luna, it has been over six years since the crime of which he was convicted was committed. Sentence upon him was pronounced four and a ha years ago, more than a year after the murder. The law requires such cases go to the jury within six months, which was not done in the case of Luna.

These facts and the exemplary life which the prisoner had led while in prison were in his favor when fina consideration was given the matter by President Diaz.

Luna was informed of the decision of the president at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon during what he thought was to have been his last interview with his aged mother and his children.
