"That a special tax is required for to the manufacture and sale of alleged medicinal alcoholic compounds or for the sale of malt extracts manufactured from' fermented liquors, the drugs used in the manufacture of which are not sufficient in amount or character to render the product unfit for use as a beverage; or, in the case of cordials, extracts and essences. in which the amount of alcohol is greater than is necessary to preserve the ingredients or to extract the properties or cut the oils and hold the same in solution.
