



The work was begun early in June, excavated. The heading has been carried on by the use of four No. 3 air drills on each side driven by duplicate plants of 75 horsepower compressors and 75 horsepower electric motors. The bulk has been mostly drilled with the same machines. The work done to date amounts to about 900 meters, and it is expected to hole the heading in January, 1908, and complete the work shortly after-

The total excavation of the tunnel is 50,000 cubic meters and the working has been done from only the two ends, as no shafts have been driven. The work has been from the beginning under the management of T. B. Slade, C. E., graduate of the United

States naval academy. It will be the largest work of the kind in the republic and a monu ment of the untiring efforts of the governor of the state, Lic. Don Joaquin Obregon Gonzalez, and the state engineer, Don Ponciano Aguilar, and the company and men who have exe-


