HUERTA ENTERTAINED BY TLALPAM SCHOOL

President Huerta was the guest of honor at a banquet given yesterday at Peña Pobre near Tlalpam by Colonel Gustavo Salas, director of the National Preparatory school in Tlalpam in honor of the students who had concluded their studies.
The dinner was served near the Peña Pobre paper factory. The tables were placed under a canopy that was decorated with festoons and garlands. The menu was composed of Mexican dishes.
Colonel Salas offered a toast to President Huerta in name of the students and professors of the military school. He said that he was highly pleased to inform the chief magistrate of the notable advancements made by the cadets during the closing term.
President Huerta answered, saying that when he entered the Tlalpam military school between the lines of cadets who accorded military honors to him, the thought came into his mind that many of these young students would be the men who will save the country in future. The chief magistrate continued recommending to

the cadets to continue their military career with the same enthusiasm that they already have shown in order to serve their country, which is in great need of well trained officers.
Lic. Jose Maria Lozano, minister of communications also spoke. His toast dealt with the importance attached in other countries to the military career. He also recalled some anecdotes of the life of President Huerta, when he was a cadet at the Chapultepec military college.
Before the dinner President Huerta and the other guests visited the military school in Tlalpam. The cadets maneuvered before the chief magistrate showing the high grade of military instruction that they have received in the school.
Those who attended the dinner beside President Huerta, were: General Aurelio Blanquet, minister of war; Lic. Manuel Garza Aldape, minister of government; Lic. Jose Maria Lozano, minister of communications and public works; Lic. Ramon Corona, governor of the Federal District; General Javier de Moura, General Arustin Breton, chief of staff of the minister of war and many others.

PENSIONS FOR MANY MICHIGAN MOTHERS

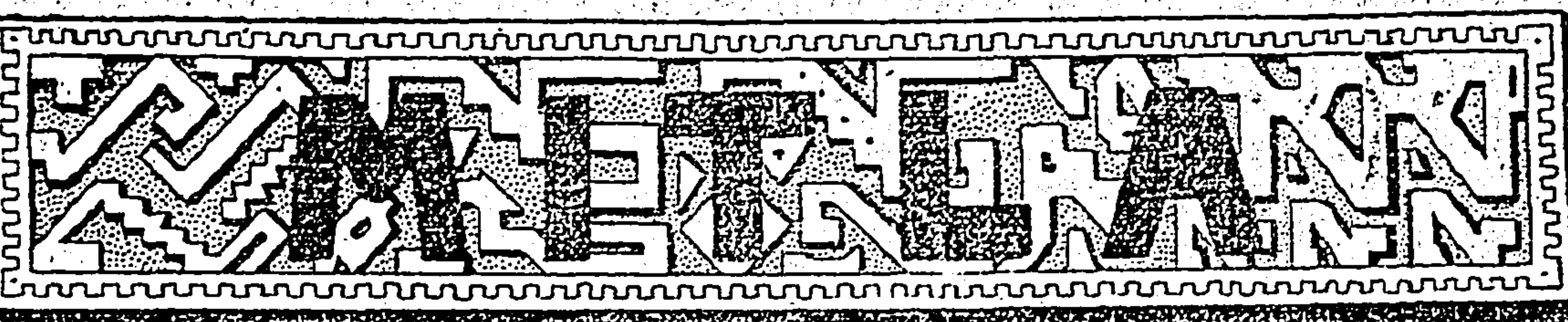
Women Object to Wording of Relief Law, Which Suggests Charity

Detroit, Nov. 2.—Applications for relief under the new mother's pension law are pouring into the probate courts of Michigan and, from present indications, thousands of dollars will be expended by various counties the first year of its operation.
The law provides that women who are without means for the support of their children shall receive a sufficient sum from the counties in which they live, but no payment shall exceed \$3 a week for each child. The act is intended to keep children under the care of their mothers, and was passed as a result of the efforts of club women and suffragists.
The sponsors of the measure are now objecting to the phrase: "Dependent on the public for support," which is contained in the statute, and an effort will be made before the next legislature to have the phrase eliminated.

CROWDS THROUGH THE BOOTHS ON ALAMEDA

Many Toys Sold to Commemorate Feast of All Souls' Day.

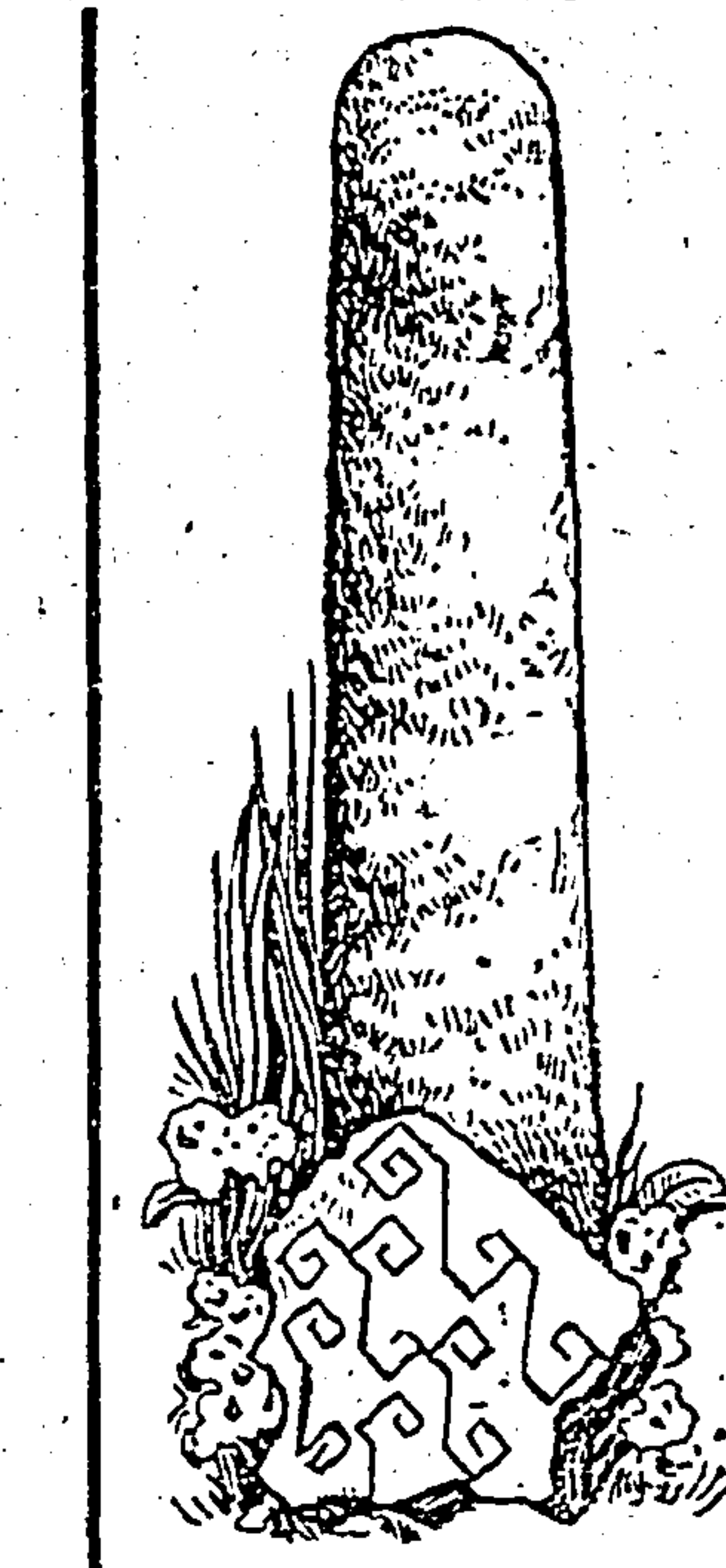
The booths erected along the north and west sides of the Alameda drew large crowds all day yesterday and up to a late hour last night. A thriving business was done in the sale of toys of all kinds commemorative of "All Souls' Day. Great quantities of "pan de muerto" and skulls, hearse, graves and weeping widows made of candy were also disposed of to the promenading throngs of men, women and children who visited the booths.
The booths of the Japanese vendors stand out strongly among the smaller booths of the native vendors. The Japanese have four large booths this year. One of these booths is devoted entirely to the sale of plants, while the other three have for sale almost everything to be found in the line of Japanese toys. The booths of the Japanese are better lighted and are more pretentious than those of the other vendors along the Alameda.
The Alameda walks in front of the booths have been pressed by many thousands of feet during the past three days. From the crowds that passed back and forth it would seem that the greater part of the population of the city had visited the neighborhood. The crowds appeared to be happy and intent only upon obtaining amusement gained by buying the little delicacies and trinkets displayed at the numerous booths. Today the booths will begin to disappear and by tomorrow night most of them will have gone. They will be back again for the Christmas posadas, which begin on December 16.

PASSING DAY

Librado and Francisco Morales, residents of the town of Topilejo, were brought to the city yesterday escorted by a detachment of federal troops under Lieutenants Manuel Gonzalez y Faustino Hernandez. It is said that these men are implicated in the Zapatista movement and are those who inform the rebels of the movements of the federal troops.
Fourteen rebels were killed in the San Jose ranch, near Urdaneo, Michoacan, in an engagement with the federal troops, under Lieutenant David Chavez, according to official reports received here. The rebels were commanded by the chieftains Delgado and Ortiz.
Juan W. Treviño, a Torreon merchant, was arrested by the city police on Sunday for alleged sedition. He is confined in the police headquarters, at the order of the minister of government.
Lic. Alejandro Garrido Noeggerat, director of El Nolicios Mexicano, was released from custody by order of the judicial authorities on Sunday. The director had been arrested the previous day by the secret police for alleged complicity in a seditious movement.
