The Polish patriots have determined upon crecting a monument commemorative of the struggle of Poland to regaining her national independence. The site chosen is in one of the most beautiful district of Switzerland, on the heights of Rapperswyl, bordering the Lake of Zurich. This memorial will consist of a column of black marble twenty-eight feet high, standing upon three platforms of granite, each of the latter serving as a step to the pedestal. On the summit will be an engle with outspread wings. Historical inscriptions and the arms of Poland are to be carved upon four tablets on the lower part of the shaft, and the whole will be surrounded by an iron railing. The work will be completed in the course of the summer. A circular from Count Ladisias Plater, dated Villa Broelberg, near Zurich, April 22, has been issued, in which an appeal is made to all who have the cause of Poland at heart to assist in carrying out this patriotic demonstration.
